Paul's epistles to young pastor Timothy are full of guidance for ministry. One of his calls is: "Remember that Jesus Christ of the seed of David was raised from the dead" (2 Tim. 2:8). This call sounds so simple. Do people need to go to seminary to learn to remember Jesus is risen? A colleague at Puritan Reformed once said that much of ministry is reminding people of what they already know. If that is true, then ministers are to remember continually the most fundamental things of Christ.

Often we forget these things to our hurt. When hostile forces surround us, like they surrounded Paul, writing from prison and Timothy in a hostile city, we then become so weak. When ones like Hymenaeus overthrow the faith of some, we become confused. When temptation comes, we become an easy prey. When we feel our own weakness and sin, our hands hang down and our hearts droop.

The remedy for these maladies is in remembering Jesus Christ. Literally, the exhortation is to "Remember

Jesus Christ...having been raised from the dead." Remember Him who shed His redeeming blood and was raised by the Father who is satisfied with that price! Remember this Seed of David who reigns forever on the throne above. Remember this living Savior whose word is not bound and whose gospel will be effectual! Remember this Jesus who suffered and now reigns to lead His suffering ones to His throne! Remember this risen head of His church!

This remembering is the knowledge of faith which produces love, submission, and adoration toward the risen Christ. This Spirit-worked remembering gives deepening humility, greater hunger to learn more of Him, and a stronger desire to teach others of Him. Such remembrance of Christ is essential for Puritan Reformed to foster and feed in students (and staff) who are to minister to others. When the living Christ blesses the seminary's service in this way, He alone will be great.

GRADUATION RECAP







We are immensely thankful to God for yet another year of His faithfulness and kindness to the Puritan Reformed faculty, staff, and students. On Friday, May 5th of 2023, Puritan Reformed celebrated the graduation of 23 students from different programs with their annual graduation ceremony. Puritan had two graduates from the Master of Arts (MA) program, seven from the Master of Divinity (MDiv), eight from the Master of Theology (ThM), and six from the Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) program. From these 23 graduates, 12 of them are international students, many of whom plan to return to their home countries to further advance the kingdom and gospel of Christ by His grace.

The ceremony itself entailed a commencement speech from Rev. Dr. David Garner, the Chief Academic Officer, Vice President of Global Ministries, and Professor of Systematic Theology at Westminster Theological Seminary. His commencement address, entitled "Moorings for Faithful Ministry," was both a challenge and encouragement for the graduates to serve in their respective ministries while receiving strength and grace from Jesus Christ daily. Dr. Joel Beeke then gave a personal charge to the graduates, focusing on the need for discriminating preaching. As usual, he also gave a "Bunyanesque" name to each of the graduates.

The following evening, the Puritan Reformed community further celebrated these individuals at the annual graduation picnic, which was a time for the seminary community and families to come together in fellowship over a meal. This time together is a great opportunity for the entire community alike to bond with one another and to cherish many of the memories that have been created throughout the years at Puritan Reformed.

The seminary looks forward to hosting its fifteenth annual Puritan Reformed Conference from August 24-26, with this year's theme being "Suffering and the Sovereignty of God." The 2023 conference speakers will include Puritan Reformed faculty members, such as Dr. Bruce Baugus and Dr. Joel Beeke to name a few, but will also include speakers such as Rev. Ian Hamilton, Anthony Kidd, and Paul Washer. Please join us and pray for God's blessing upon the conference and upon the speakers.



WILLIAM PERKINS'S ARRIVAL AT THE WILLIAM PERKINS LIBRARY!

A few months ago, when I was speaking at a conference for Faith Free Presbyterian Church in Greenville, South Carolina, I was called to come up front to unveil an amazingly beautiful bust of William Perkins, often called "the father of Puritanism," that a member of their church, Jodie Barnes, had sculpted as a gift for our William Perkins Library at Puritan Reformed Seminary. Pastor Jeff Johnson of the Grace Emmanuel Reformed Baptist Church of Grand Rapids graciously brought the bust home with him from Greenville, and then over to us at the seminary, at the end of our daily prayer time, where it was unveiled a second time and enjoyed by some of our faculty and staff.

Having worked for nearly ten years on editing and printing *The Works of William Perkins* (10 vols., Reformation Heritage Books), and having lectured on him often, I was delighted to receive Mr. Perkins together with my Queen. We decided to place him in our Puritan Research Center

(PRC), which houses one of the world's largest collections of Puritan writings, just beside an early seventeenth-century collection of his complete works that Charles Spurgeon owned (his personal seal is in each volume), and later A. W. Pink possessed (who sprinkled his pencil marks of approval throughout). Many thanks to Jodie Barnes for her fine work!

Above all, may God bless the rich heritage of Perkins and the Puritans that, happily, is increasingly being treasured around the world today, and that He would turn many theological students into God-blessed ministers of the gospel who would carry on the biblical, Reformed, experiential, and practical tradition in our contemporary and needy day that Perkins so faithfully proclaimed by his life, voice, and pen until God took him home at the tender age of 44. Greetings from Myanmar. The Lord has been gracious to my family and me, granting us peace in our labors. My wife is a precious and faithful helpmate to me in numerous ways, for which I praise God. Our son, David, is about to turn five, and our daughter, Grace, will be ten months old soon. We are enjoying the love and faithfulness of God in our daily walk, and we pray that the Lord will bring many more people into His kingdom in 2023.



We realize that we are just sinners saved by grace alone, and we depend solely on the Lord to carry out His gracious work through the Holy Spirit. We ask that you pray for us that we will be able to discern the leading of the Lord and always be submissive to His will in everything we do. Myanmar needs the Lord; He alone can transform the people's hearts through His gospel.

CHRISTMAS 2022

Over the Christmas season, we visited a few villages to share the story of Christ's birth and had a number of unbelievers attend our gatherings. One such place was Kala Kung Village, where we plan, with the Lord's help, to plant a church. When we share the gospel there, I ask the people which is easier, "man trying to become God or God taking on human form?" This is an intriguing question for Buddhists.

At our meeting we had a Buddhist nun who listened intently to our message. Approximately 50 unbelievers in all came out to listen to the gospel. Afterwards, we provided lunch for everyone.

We invited these unbelievers to our Christmas celebration in our home church. Many came and listened to the Christmas message. Once again, we provided a lunch for everyone who attended the service. We are praying that the message they heard will soon bear fruit in their own lives.

CHURCH PLANTING

North Dagon City Church is growing and on December 26, we had a baptismal service in which ten people were

baptized. We serve the community through a regular outreach program and distribution of food and other essential items, none of which we could accomplish without the financial support and prayers of others and the Lord's gracious blessing of it all. Thank you all for your support.

Because of our faithful partners, we have recently been able to do the following:

- We visited more than 40 homes and shared the gospel with the family members.
- We have shared over 500 gospel tracts in the neighboring communities.
- We have been able to rent a meeting hall for regular worship services.
- We have been used to edify and encourage believers through various activities.
- We have baptized ten people this year.
- We are seeing the Lord bless our efforts by increasing our numbers.

The English Puritan, Thomas Watson, put it like this:



CHURCH EMBEDDED MINISTRY EDUCATION

Support and momentum for our Church Embedded Ministry Education Model (CEMEM) of theological training continues to grow. We are pleased to announce the availability of a Church Embedded MDiv degree program for the fall of 2023.

The CEMEM program began last year with a generous grant from the Lilly Endowment's Pathways for Tomorrow Initiative. The Pathways Initiative enables theological schools to take deliberate steps to address the challenges that are critical to ensuring that Christian congregations continue to have a steady stream of pastoral leaders who are well prepared to lead the churches of tomorrow.

Puritan Reformed's objective is to enrich our MDiv program with more practical experience by embedding students in their home church, another local church, or a service-based ministry while completing the bulk of their academic study remotely.

The Church Embedded MDiv program offers the same accredited degree and academic rigor in a way suitable for students who are better off not relocating to meet the residency requirements of the traditional MDiv program. The "embedded" aspect of the program enables students to remain in their congregation or local ministry, where they work under the direction and nurture of a personal mentor and supported by the local eldership or ministry board.

Most academic coursework will be completed remotely with others in live or online classes, under the direction of a Puritan Reformed academic mentor. The program uses a specially designed web application to track and assess assignments done within the ministry setting and to maintain the vital communication link between the student and both mentors. Embedded students will also benefit from the Puritan Reformed on-campus experience by joining others in two-week intensive course sessions that will be offered each year.

We recognize that the effectiveness of remote education and mentorship programs can vary widely. We remain committed to upholding the reputation for academic excellence that Puritan Reformed has earned, while strengthening the practical experience component of training to better equip our graduates for ministry.
